

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need. Under the Quality of Education criteria (p41) inspectors consider the extent to which schools can articulate their curriculum (INTENT), construct their curriculum (IMPLEMENTATION) and demonstrate the outcomes which result (IMPACT).

It was clear to see that some children were becoming disengaged with the curriculum as there were some sports that they really did not want to participate in for a - week block. The new curriculum means that a skill will be develop and not a sport, lending itself to more differentiation and more engagement from pupils. Children were constantly finding the PE coordination to find out what they would be doing the next week. We were also able to give the children the opportunity to watch sports influencers compete or talk at the start of each lesson, highlighting to children the importance of what they are doing and offering some inspiration.
